Water Baptism is Essential

New Testament Christians have seen baptism as a defining act of the Christian faith since the beginning of the church (Acts 2:38, 47). Over the course of the past two millennia, some have come to understand baptism differently than how it was explained and practiced during th days of the Apostles. If baptism was deemed important to the Apostles and the first century Christians, why is it considered non-essential now?

The essence of baptism is an act of obedience on the part of the believer. After a person realizes the need to be reconciled to God - and that this can only be accomplished through the finished work of Christ on the cross - one repents of sin and submits to baptism. The Greek term *baptidzo* (transliterated as baptize) means to immerse, dip, or plunge. In ancient literature this word was used to describe the total immersion of cloth during the dyeing process or to sunken ships. There is never any indication in the earliest Christian literature that baptism was viewed as anything other than an immersion of the individual in water.

Baptism is a symbol of a believer's spiritual union with Christ. The apostle Paul indicates as such when he wrote that believers are buried with Christ (Romand 6:3-4) and clothed with Chris (Gal. 3:27). This marks a person's entry in to the kingdom, or the church (1 Cor. 12:13).

While some, yea perhaps most, religious groups downplay the significance of baptism, it should be noted that it is a direct command of Jesus Himself that believers are to baptize other believers (Matt. 28:19). Acts is replete with examples of believers being immersed for the remission of their sins as a result of the proclamation of the gospel call. In a passage that makes explicit reference to the practice, Jesus tells Nicodemus that no one can enter the kingdom of God except they are born of water and of the Spirit (John 3:5).

Christian's often hear the objection that baptism cannot save a person because salvation is by "grace alone" (Eph. 2:8-9). Man is saved by grace, just not grace alone. While goods works alone do not save a person, grace does not negate responsibility on the part of the believer. Ephesians 2:8 state that one is saved by grace AND faith. Grace is God's part, faith is man's part. The Apostle Peter told the crowd on the Day of Pentecost to repent and be baptized for the remission of sins (Acts 2:38). He then wrote in 1 Peter 3:21, "baptism doth now save you." Paul also says that the Christian is saved through the washing of regeneration (Titus 3:5), a passage the early church understood to teach the necessity of baptism. Ultimately, baptism is not the *how* of salvation, but the *when* and *where* a person enters into the state of salvation.

A common objection against the necessity of baptism for salvation is the thief on the cross (Luke 23:39-43). A popular response is to say that the thief might have been baptized. He might have had John's baptism. The text is silent concerning his baptism status. Neither side can make an argument there. The thief lived under the Old Law, and was face-to-face with the Savior (i.e. God Himself) and as such God can offer salvation to anyone He chooses. Jesus forgave sins on a number of occasions as He walked the earth (e.g. Mark 2:10; Luke 7:48). Just as this is not how Jesus forgives sins today, this is also not how He saves people today.

Baptism is a one-time act. When a believer is taught the pure gospel of Christ (Acts 8:26-39), and baptism is administered, that person is forever a child of God and never needs baptism again. Will that child need restoration? Yes! Just not baptism. Repentance and confession of sin is all that is necessary.

There was a group of people that needed to be baptized even though they had been baptized though. This group had erroneously, though sincerely, taught John's baptism. When they learned the truth, they were baptized for the remission of their sins which they still had and were then added to the Lord's church (Acts 19:1-5).
